Community Paramedicine

- Pilot Launch
 - Theory of Change
- Clients
 - 116 clients entered into MHIN
 - Demographics
 - 75% of clients are between 40 and 69 years old
 - Addresses are concentrated around downtown, west side, and south west side
- Referrals
 - More social service referrals than medical referrals
- Outcomes
 - Utilization of Emergency Visits, PCP, Inpatient Visits decreased in target population
 - SBFD calls and transports decreased in target population
 - Days in program decreased—CP is more comfortable discharging people, more familiar with resources
 - Financial Impact—biggest impact is in system savings
- Lessons Learned
 - Changed assumptions—greater focus on social services
 - Data quality—adding closure reasons, more options for charting social needs (referrals)
 - Referrals—not currently capturing all the work CP is doing
- Next Steps
 - Adding CP positions, potential partnerships, layering other City data
 - Infant Mortality—My Brother's Keeper, Labor of Love
