



Gun Violence Discourse: while public interest and concerns increased throughout the month, Chief Ruszkowski's call to come forward was appreciated and seemed to ease some concerns



"The analysis suggests that resident interest and concerns - reflected by the number of interactions and comments - have increased from incident to incident. Nonetheless, the most discussed story was Chief Ruszkowski's post and his call to residents to come forward and help the police in their investigations - a post that was greatly appreciated and supported. It seems the community was in need of an early statement or one by the Police Chief - as demonstrated by the fact that the later community leaders' assembly attracted much less attention."

Group Violence Intervention

What

Implemented in 2014, South Bend Group Violence Intervention (SBGVI) unites community leaders around a common goal: to stop gun violence and keep South Bend's highest risk citizens alive and out of prison.

Who

South Bend Police Department Office of Community Initiatives S.A.V.E Outreach Team Goodwill St. Joseph County Prosecutor's Office And 25 more...

How

- Empowers community members to set clear moral standards against violence in their communities and reclaim a voice in the way they want to live
- Coordinates the efforts of local, state and federal law enforcement to focus crime prevention
 efforts on the groups most associated with gun violence
- Draws on the expertise of social service providers to offer group members a path away from violence

Group Violence Intervention FAQ

- **Q** Why is this initiative important?
- A [Answer 1]
- **Q** What is a Custom Notification?
- A Custom notifications are conversations with group members that they are valued members of the community, give individualized information about their legal risk, and offer opportunities for help to break the cycle of violence.
- **Q** Why is it "group" and not "gang"?
- Research finds that most homicides and shootings are committed by members of highly active street groups—these groups are gangs, drug crews, and the like. *All gangs are groups, but not all groups are gangs*.


