Council President Lee requested reports from the Sub-Committee on Minutes.

Detective Wells highlighted the achievements of the student athletes and thanked the Council for honoring them with a special resolution.

Caleb Williams, PAL Coach, 3102 Mishawaka Avenue, South Bend, IN 46615, congratulated the student athletes and acknowledged their hard work.

Student athletes Joel Wells and Zyarie Washington gave reflections on their experience and thanked their coaches.

Councilmembers made final remarks recognizing program coordinators and parents, congratulating the athletes, and encouraging them to continue with the program.

Clerk Tirado read the bill to the Council for its second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading.

After the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading, Councilmember Gooden-Rodgers stated that Substitute Bill *No.* <u>53-</u> <u>25</u> went before the Community Relations Committee and comes with a favorable recommendation.

Councilmember Bolden-Simpson, 6216 Exeter Court, South Bend, IN 46614, and Councilmember Dr. Davis, 1801 Nash Street, South Bend, IN 46613, presented the substitute bill. They explained that the bill affirms the Community Police Review Board (CPRB)'s right to review law enforcement recordings under the Indiana Open Door Law and further clarifies CPRB duties.

Attorney Bob Palmer, with offices on the fourth (4<sup>th</sup>) floor of the County-City Building, South Bend, IN 46601, explained that language was changed in the substitute bill to achieve its purpose without being broader than intended.

Councilmember Sharon McBride moved to accept Substitute Bill *No.* <u>53-25</u>, which was seconded by Council Vice President Rachel Tomas-Morgan and carried via a vote by voice.

Councilmember Troy Warner opened the public hearing.

Joseph Adams, CPRB Chair, 3400 High Street, South Bend, IN 46614, spoke in favor, stating that the bill affirms CPRB's authority to perform appropriate checks and balances.

Bob Masters, CPRB Attorney, 350 Columbia Street, South Bend, IN 46601, spoke in favor, stating that the bill represents the City's commitment to transparency and accountability through citizen oversight.

Councilmember Warner closed the public hearing.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan moved to send Substitute Bill *No.* <u>53-25</u> to the Full Council with a favorable recommendation, which was seconded by Councilmember Tomas-Morgan and carried by a vote of nine (9) ayes.

Clerk Tirado read the bill to the Council for its second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading.

After the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading, Councilmember Niezgodski stated that Bill *No.* <u>54-25</u> went before the Personnel and Finance Committee and comes with a favorable recommendation.

Kyle Willis, City Controller, with offices on the fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) floor of the County-City Building, South Bend, IN 46601, explained key appropriations in the bill, including the appropriation from fund number one-hundred-one (#101) to cover emergency medical services (EMS) drug costs, building repair and maintenance costs, auto repair and maintenance costs, and equipment replacement costs.

Councilmember Warner held the public hearing, and nobody spoke.

Councilmember Niezgodski moved to send Bill *No.* <u>54-25</u> to the Full Council with a favorable recommendation, which was seconded by Councilmember Dr. Davis and carried by a vote of nine (9) ayes.

Clerk Tirado read the bill to the Council for its second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading.

After the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading, Councilmember Niezgodski stated that Bill *No.* <u>55-25</u> went before the Personnel and Finance Committee and comes with a favorable recommendation.

Kyle Willis stated that the budget transfers will fund professional services for the Human Rights Commission and Controller's Office.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan asked Kyle Willis to explain why funds are being transferred from the employee benefits budget to cover professional services.

Kyle Willis replied that employee benefits were overbudgeted, citing the fact that most departments have reduced this line item in their 2026 budget proposals.

Councilmember Warner held the public hearing and nobody spoke.

Councilmember Dr. Davis moved to send Bill *No.* <u>55-25</u> to the Full Council with a favorable recommendation, which was seconded by Councilmember Bolden-Simpson and carried by a vote of nine (9) ayes.

Clerk Tirado read the bill to the Council for its second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading.

After the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading, Councilmember Niezgodski stated that Bill *No.* <u>56-25</u> went before the Personnel and Finance Committee and comes with no recommendation.

Councilmember Warner announced that no action will be taken on the bill at this time, and there will be a presentation and public hearing only.

Mayor James Mueller, with offices on the fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) floor of the County-City Building, South Bend, IN 46601, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the City budget. He discussed spending priorities for 2026, gave projections of property tax revenues through 2028, and spoke about the impact of new state legislation on income taxes. He stated that under the new tax structure, taxpayers will likely be paying more for the same or lower service level. He shared the proposed budget for each department and the projected cash reserve balances for 2026. He provided a breakdown of the 2026 deficit and shared historical spend-down data showing that the budget deficit has not been fully realized in previous years.

Councilmember Gooden-Rodgers and Councilmember Bolden-Simpson said they would follow up with any questions.

Councilmember Dr. Davis asked if City residents will be taxed twice under the new tax structure, by both the City and the County.

Mayor Mueller confirmed that is correct.

Councilmember Dr. Davis asked what can be done to work with the County and ensure the new tax rates are in the best interest of City residents.

Mayor Mueller said the City would benefit from the County fully utilizing fire protection local income tax. He added that the County is also impacted by the new tax structure, and the best scenario would be a change in the state legislation.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan noted Mayor Mueller's statement that the City would be in a better position if they cut an additional three-million dollars (\$3,000,000) from the 2026 budget. She asked at what point the Council should consider making the additional cuts.

Mayor Mueller replied that the cuts proposed for <u>2026</u> were intended to minimize any negative impact on the City, and the next round of cuts will be more obvious to residents. He said deeper cuts may become necessary as more information about the new tax legislation becomes available.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan asked if the City will be able to uphold their multi-year commitments.

Mayor Mueller said that is one of the concerns under the new tax structure. He acknowledged the uncertainty in current revenue projections and said revenues at the lower end of the projected range would pose a significant hardship for the City. At the higher end of the range, revenue would remain flat through 2028, requiring further cuts as costs rise year-over-year.

Councilmember Niezgodski noted that the <u>2026</u> budget deficit would leave thirty-four-million dollars (\$34,000,000) in cash reserves above the required balance, and historically, the City's budget deficits have not been fully realized. She said her takeaway from the presentation is that the <u>2026</u> budget proposal is feasible, but cuts will continue to be necessary in future budget years.

Mayor Mueller agreed with Councilmember Niezgodksi's takeaway and said the City is working to balance spending with revenues.

Councilmember McBride thanked Mayor Mueller for his leadership through the budget process.

Councilmember Karen L. White thanked Mayor Mueller for the presentation. She said the Council will continue to work with the mayoral administration to stay aware of the changes and uncertainties in the City's financial position.

Council President Lee asked at what point the City would need to spend down rainy day funds.

Mayor Mueller said this will not happen because it is a short-term solution that would negatively impact the City's bond rating.

Councilmember Warner acknowledged the need to work toward a balanced budget and expressed support for the <u>2026</u> budget cuts.

Mayor Mueller added that the City has other revenue sources that could potentially be accessed if income tax revenue becomes insufficient.

Councilmember Warner opened the public hearing.

Sue Kesim, 4022 Kennedy Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, spoke against the bill, stating that the amount of financial data shared with the public before the hearing was insufficient. She expressed opposition to the spend-down of cash reserves and the issuance of tax abatements.

Jesse Davis, P.O. Box 10205, South Bend, IN 46680, spoke against the bill and echoed Sue Kesim's points on tax abatements. He called for more transparency with financial records.

Councilmember Warner closed the public hearing.

Clerk Tirado read the bill to the Council for its second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading.

After the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) reading, Councilmember Warner stated that Bill *No.* <u>58-25</u> went before the Community Investment Committee and comes with a favorable recommendation.

Caleb Bauer, Executive Director of Community Investment, with offices on the fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) floor of the County-City Building, South Bend, IN 46601, gave a PowerPoint presentation detailing the terms of the development agreement with New Day Intake Center.

Sheila McCarthy, Executive Director of New Day Intake Center, 323 Lincolnway West, Mishawaka, IN 46544, gave the Council an update on the progress of the project.

Councilmember Gooden-Rodgers asked if the construction will be done by local unions and contractors.

Jon Schommer, Board Treasurer of New Day Intake Center, 744 South Main Street, South Bend, IN 46601, replied that they are required to put the project up for bid and will be trying to prioritize local contractors

Sheila McCarthy added that they must comply with the Davis-Bacon labor standards as a provision of their federal grant.

Councilmember Gooden-Rodgers said she observed a lack of diversity at the groundbreaking and asked for statistics related to diversity in senior-level roles.

Sheila McCarthy replied that many staff members were unable to attend the groundbreaking. She said the racial diversity among staff members reflects the diversity of the community they serve.

Councilmember Bolden-Simpson asked what metrics are considered when selecting candidates in the hiring process.

Sheila McCarthy said they try to ensure the demographics of their guests are proportionately represented by their staff, which she described as mostly local, fifty percent (50%) African American, fifty percent (50%) white, one-third (1/3) female, and two-thirds (2/3) male. She added that empathy and strong boundaries are requirements for all candidates.

Council President Lee asked for a construction timeline.

Sheila McCarthy said they hired a construction manager last week and they are starting the bidding process for contractors. She said they will know the construction start date in the next week or two (2).

Council President Lee asked what will happen to Knights Inn once New Day Intake Center opens.

Caleb Bauer said the Redevelopment Commission approved an option to purchase the Knights Inn facility for one dollar (\$1) as part of the development agreement. He said the Redevelopment Commission can exercise this option six (6) months after the new facility opens.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan asked for an update on fundraising progress for annual operating costs.

Sheila McCarthy said they expect to raise this money by the end of the year, noting that they are having a fundraising event next month and will continue to seek grant funding.

Margaret Pfeil, Board President of New Day Intake Center, 511 South Saint Joseph Street, South Bend, IN 46601, said they are hoping to network with Notre Dame alumni and leverage public-private partnerships to sustain operations on an ongoing basis.

Councilmember Warner held the public hearing, and nobody spoke. Councilmember Warner asked for final remarks from Councilmembers.

Council Vice President Tomas-Morgan said she was encouraged by the response to her question and emphasized the importance of sustainable development.

Councilmember Niezgodski moved to send Bill *No.* <u>58-25</u> to the Full Council with a favorable recommendation, which was seconded by Councilmember McBride and carried by a vote of nine (9) ayes.

# PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

Valerie Weis, 1506 West Mackey Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, shared concerns about new development in the Lafayette Falls neighborhood. She presented a petition signed by seventy-seven (77) neighborhood residents, explaining there is effectively one (1) road into the community and traffic is unable to move freely in an emergency situation.

Tom Ferguson, 6810 Stewart Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, gave examples of recent events in Lafayette Falls where emergency responders were on the scene and residents were unable to exit the neighborhood.

Kathleen Szymanski, 6606 Armstrong Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, echoed the safety concerns about traffic control in Lafayette Falls and mentioned that construction equipment has made the streets more dangerous to navigate.

Anne McCartney, 6845 Mackey Court, South Bend, IN 46614, expressed concern for the safety of the children in Lafayette Falls and said that getting on the school bus is dangerous.

Matthew Schoen, 6819 Stewart Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, shared concerns about the lack of pedestrian infrastructure in Lafayette Falls, which results in people walking their dogs and children playing in the streets.

Mike Davis, 6818 Stewart Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, said that the streets in Lafayette Falls operate as a single lane. He said residents are stuck inside the neighborhood during trash pickup hours and expressed concern about the impact of over seventy-five (75) new homes.

Angelina Roderick, 6811 Lutz Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, said that the residents of Lafayette Falls welcome growth but demand a traffic safety plan, secondary access route, and usable public walking space.

James Hardig, 1514 West Mackey Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, echoed the safety concerns of other Lafayette Falls residents, noting that there will be more than four-hundred (400) homes with a single entrance to the neighborhood.

Lakrissa Trujillo, 6811 Lutz Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, spoke about how traffic in Lafayette Falls is impacted after a storm when power lines and trees are down. She expressed concern for her own teenage children navigating the neighborhood.

Alissa Bahr, 1514 West Mackey Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, said that the single existing entrance to Lafayette Falls is unsafe due to the lack of turn lanes and lane markings.

Brad Weis, 1506 West Mackey Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, said the developer is using the quarry in Lafayette Falls to meet the public space requirement. He said this is not a safe or accessible public space and it will not divert foot traffic from the streets.

Russell Burch, 6735 Hillenbrand Drive, South Bend, IN 46614, echoed the safety concerns of other Lafayette Falls residents and said the roads are particularly dangerous during the winter.

Council President Lee acknowledged the concerns of Lafayette Falls residents. He said Councilmember Dr. Davis and Councilmember Bolden-Simpson will collaborate with residents, Community Investment, and Public Works to find a solution for the neighborhood.
